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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The word 'Plassey' is etched in our collective consciousness with a sense of poignancy. It is because the conquest of East India Company in the Battle of Plassey on 23rd of June 1757 against the last sovereign Nawab of Bengal Siraj ud-Daulah had momentous consequences in terms of the political history of the Indian sub-continent.

Plassey College was established as an undergraduate college on 4th October 2010. It is located near Bhagirathi River, approximately 50 km from the city of Krishnanagar in the Nadia District of West Bengal. The distance between Plassey and Kolkata by road is 150 kilometers and is connected by both bus and train. The NH-12 connecting Kolkata to Siliguri passes through Plassey. From the railway station the College is a 5 minutes' walk. It is located in a socio-economically backward area. It aims to cater to the demands of the students hailing from marginalized and economically backward strata of society by providing a veritable platform for first generation learners.

The college is a **grant-in-aid general degree college** affiliated to the **University of Kalyani**, offering five subjects in both Honours and Programme Courses: while English, Bengali, Political Science, History, and Education are offered in both Honours and programme courses. Geography and Physical Education, however, are offered exclusively in Programme Courses. However, after the introduction of the New Education Policy (NEP-2020) Honours and programme courses are going to be replaced by major and minor courses. The student intake capacity currently is 4946 and the demand for admission is surging. Apart from the main academic building, the College is also equipped with an Annexe building-1 (Block B). One more building is under construction. It aims to open Science courses in future.

In a globalized world, the importance of professional and skill-based add on courses has grown exponentially. The college acknowledges the realities. Infrastructural development aims to achieve academic and extracurricular activities.

The college has signed **MoU with Netaji Subhas Open University** to run PG courses in six subjects: Bengali, English, History, Political Science, Education and Master of Social Work (MSW) in ODL mode.

Vision

The stalwart of the Black Liberation Movement Nelson Mandela once said, "Education is the great engine of personal development. It is through education that the daughter of a peasant can become a doctor, that the son of a mine worker can become the head of the mine that a child of farm workers can become the president of a great nation."

The college is in a socio-economically backward area with a substantial minority and scheduled caste

population. Hence it is imperative for the college to understand the idea of Social Justice enshrined in the Constitution of India and to implement it within its jurisdiction in letter and spirit. Keeping this in mind the vision of the college is as follows:

- To provide opportunities to students coming from marginalized strata of society to empower them to deal with the challenges of life both academic as well as personal.
- To motivate students to achieve excellence in higher education learning.
- The number of girl students has consistently been higher than the number of boys over the years. The college is committed to women's empowerment by motivating girl students to complete their studies.
- To keep pace with the evolving teaching methods, effective and alternative techniques such as various ICT tools, and interactive methods of teaching.
- To develop analytical ability, critical and independent thinking among the students.
- To sustain a caring, supportive climate throughout the college.
- To enhance the effective and efficient management of the college.

Mission

- The college aims to provide the best education possible to students hailing from diverse backgrounds.
- The college is committed to creating a level playing field among students so that none feels abandoned.
- College provides an environment of learning beyond the prejudices and stereotypes of class, caste, religion, and gender biases.
- The college fosters a sense of social responsibility among different stakeholders through instilling moral and human values in them.
- The college provides a platform where, during the most formative years of their lives, students may learn to explore, argue, and assess all social, economic, cultural, and environmental issues before them.
- The college endeavors to produce skilled individuals capable of making the world around them a better place to live in.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The academic flexibility of the college allows the students to opt from a wide range of programs and courses as per NEP-2020.
- Professors of eminence from the University are invited to various seminars, webinars, workshops in collaboration with the departments and the IQAC of the college.
- The teachers are committed towards continuous development and upgradation of qualification. They remain in touch with the major and recent developments in their respective academic fields. The energetic and committed teachers are the major pillar of strength of the institution.
- The college boasts of a harmonious relationship among the administration, faculty, staff and students, and alumni to foster the progressive endeavors of the college.
- The student-friendly attitude of the administration is a strength of the college. The administration concentrates on demands from each level of employees and students through feedback mechanism, analyzes the demands and takes decisions accordingly to support the best teaching-learning environment.
- Extended activities like participation of students in various NSS led initiatives inspire them to be an

active part of society.

- The college boasts of augmenting its IT infrastructure to greater heights. The introduction of Smart Classrooms with ICT facilities, fully automated digital library, computer lab, digital notice boards, high speed internet service are some of the areas where college has invested substantial energy and resources.
- The college is located in an environmentally friendly area with less pollution and environmental hazards. The greenery in and around the campus gives the college a strength to realize the potential of an eco-friendly campus. It is also one of our best practices to focus more on the environmental aspect especially at a time when the threat of climate change looms large.
- Besides academic pursuits we firmly believe that extra-curricular activities embolden the character of students to develop their personality to the fullest. To achieve this, we organize cultural programs on a regular basis, Yoga and Karate classes have also been introduced as part of add on courses to substantiate the claim.

Institutional Weakness

- Shortage of full-time teachers resulting in poor student-teacher ratio.
- Shortage of adequate non- teaching staff.
- In the pandemic situation when classes and teaching-learning process has become online, many of our students who are from low-income groups and in poor network coverage area could not attend the classes regularly.
- We are a college of mostly first-generation learners and of poor economic backgrounds which pose severe hindrance to their academic programmes

Institutional Opportunity

- The college is situated beside National Highway 12. It is well connected by rail and road. The college is easily accessible on public transport.
- The college considers the huge diversity of students as a major opportunity to emerge as an institution promoting brotherhood and global competence.
- The environment within the college campus is peaceful and amicable which gives an opportunity for robust interaction and exchange of opinion among different stakeholders.
- Promoting collaboration with various Government and non-Government organization is another major opportunity for the college. The college has signed MoUs with various educational institutions and professional organizations.
- Effective and optimum utilization of college funds (in most useful heads) the college could provide more modernized technique before the efficient teachers and facilitate the students.

Institutional Challenge

- The college is in Nadia district bordering our neighboring country of Bangladesh. The district has been enlisted as backward both in the reports of State and Central Government with substantial number of people falling below the poverty line.
- A huge number of the students at the college hail from a poor to very poor background. These students mostly belong to the minority community, scheduled castes, and Other Backward Classes category. Most of the students are first-generation learners. As such, the college faces a huge challenge in

uplifting these students to the mainstream of society.

- The number of female students in the institution is quite high. This is noticeable from the admission pattern in the last couple of years. They hail mostly from the minority community and the poor financial background of society. They also get married at an early age often without completing their studies. The college faces the challenge of transforming them into responsible citizens who can match shoulder to shoulder with the boys in the three years of their academic life.
- The student-teacher ratio is a major challenge of the college. However, the recruitment of Full-Time Teachers and part time faculty is beyond the capacity of the college.
- During Covid pandemic when teaching-learning process has become digitally driven, a huge number of our students who are from low-income groups and in poor network coverage area could not attend the classes regularly.
- Although the college acknowledges the areas mentioned above as prospective challenges, it believes that every opportunity is a challenge, and every challenge is an opportunity in disguise. The college has addressed these challenges and working on them tirelessly to overcome the obstacles to achieve the distinction as a center of learning.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The College is affiliated to the University of Kalyani. The CBCS curriculum implemented by the University from the academic session 2018-2019 has properly been executed by the College.
- Modular curriculums have been prepared by the respective departments at the beginning of each academic session with proper syllabus modularization.
- After the introduction of CBCS, an orientation/ induction program for all the newly admitted students is conducted to induce them into the curriculum.
- The institution adheres to the Academic calendar of the University and prepares another of its own where all teaching days, observation days, seminars, study tours and examination dates are mentioned for the students.
- The College is a PG Study Centre of NSOU in ODL mode since 2021.
- The college offers two programmes namely B.A.(Honours) and B.A. (Pass). Five subjects are offered in Honours courses, such as, Bengali, English, History, Political Science and Education and three subjects namely Physical Education, Sociology and Geography are offered in program or pass course.
- Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) mechanism has been started from the academic session 2018-2019.
- Seminars and workshops related to curriculum are organized periodically. Students also participate in experiential learning through project work and study tours as per the curriculum.
- For the social and psychological development of the students all the crosscutting issues are addressed through proper curriculum delivery.
- An emphasis has also been given to life skill, Soft Skill and value-added courses. Yoga, Karate and Computer classes have been introduced.
- The college has a feedback system in place. Feedback is sought from students regarding curriculum, academic and administrative performance of the college. Feedback is taken both in online and offline format. This feedback is collected, analyzed and action taken reports are prepared accordingly by the IQAC.
- Academic and Administrative audits are conducted at each academic session for smooth and effective functioning of the college.

- Through the meetings of the Academic sub-committee the departmental heads and the administrative members discuss the betterment of the curriculum delivery and plan for future actions.
- Some of the proposals are conveyed through the members of the Undergraduate Board of Studies (UG BoS), University of Kalyani.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- In every academic session, the college receives more than six thousand applications. The entire admission process is online. Since 2014-15 the college has adopted an on-line merit-based admission system which ensures transparency, objectivity, and precision. Students are selected on the basis of cut off marks and through the reservation policy prescribed by the Govt. of West Bengal and University of Kalyani.
- Students-teacher relationship and interaction within and outside the classroom is vibrant as reflected in the students' feedback.
- As per the academic calendar, the curriculum is delivered through different levels of student centric methods like experiential learning and participative learning like students' seminars, project works, wall magazine etc.
- Apart from the core classes, the institution assesses the learning levels of the students through CIE and the slow learners are addressed in the tutorial and remedial classes where for the advanced learner's exposure have been provided through seminars, workshops etc.
- To inculcate effective teaching-learning, the teachers use ICT enabled tools: smart classroom, access to INFLIBNET via library, online classes, and class tests through Google Meet etc. The teaching methodology is enriched through effective use of experiential and participative learning, constructivism, and optimum use of ICT along with conventional classroom teaching.
- Online **Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS)** regarding the teaching learning process has been introduced; links to the survey are provided at the website. Students wholeheartedly participate in the survey and provide responses and suggestions from the academic session of 2022-2023.
- Through Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) the Institution conducts formative evaluation in a robust way. After the evaluation the shortcomings are discussed with students to make them prepare for the summative evaluation and achieve the program and course outcomes which are already communicated prior to the program.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- Most of the faculty members are involved in research activities, publications, attending academic conferences and seminars and presenting research articles etc.
- Many of the teachers including State Aided College Teachers (SACTs) get themselves registered into Doctoral research program in various Universities and get Ph.D.
- To facilitate more research activities, the College encourages all departments to conduct seminars/webinars of all sorts in offline and online mode.
- The IQAC took the initiative to publish a book titled '**Multidimensional Impact of Covid 19 Pandemic in India**' (ISBN 978-93-91979-90-4 in May 2023) in which faculty members of Plassey College and faculties of other institutions and research scholars of various universities contributed their chapters.
- The College has signed MoUs with 7 eminent Colleges to pave ways for collaborative activities and

build an ecosystem for innovation.

- The college has N-LIST INFLIBNET subscription which is of great help for faculty members to carry out with their research activities.
- The NSS Unit of the College and the Kanyashree Club arrange several Extension activities around the locality for the holistic development of the participants through the development of the society.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The institution has developed infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning.
- The College has classrooms with ICT facilities. Besides a virtual classroom, 5 of the classrooms have been upgraded with ICT facilities with LCD and projector facility.
- The College has successfully contributed to the building of eco-friendly facilities like Solar Power Plant, LED lights coverage.
- The college has a functional Geography and Physical Education lab.
- The College has prepared an ICT enabled Seminar Room named “Rabindra-Nazrul Hall” at the College premises with hundred sitting capacities to facilitate the academic and cultural activities of the students.
- There is a well-maintained multi-gym with indoor game facilities to enhance the physical abilities of the students.
- Yoga and Karate facilities have been provided to the students by hiring instructors.
- The Library of the College has been fully automated with Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) (Koha: **19.05.06**) since 2019.
- Students’ facilities like purified drinking water with RO Certificate, water treatment facility (Sajal Dhara), canteen, renovation of the toilets have been done.
- A Computer lab with 32 computers is functional. There are two computers for students in the Student Reading Room and one in the Teacher Reading Room along with two computers each in IQAC room, Central Library, Departmental Library and Teachers Room.
- The office has CCTV, LAN, AC, new computers, and requisite furniture. The teaching staff room also has two ACs.
- CCTVs have been installed all over the College premises for security and surveillance.
- A girl’s common room with Breastfeeding Zone, two sanitary napkin vending machines, and an indoor game facility has been installed.
- There is a room earmarked for sick and divyang students with toilet and wheelchair facilities.
- Two Digital Notice boards, one in Administrative Block and the other one in Academic Block is equipped with LAN connection.

Student Support and Progression

- The students get government scholarship benefits apart from which during pandemic tuition fees had been partially waived to support the students financially and psychologically.
- Capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives have been taken by the institution by arranging seminars or webinars on life skills, arrangement of classes and programs on Yoga, health, and hygiene.
- The Career Counseling Cell of the college organizes seminars and awareness camps with reputed institutes such as Rice Education and George Telegraph to enable job opportunities among students.
- The College has a dedicated Grievance Redressal Cell. The grievances from the students submitted online and offline and addressed regularly.
- The College has an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) and an Anti-Ragging Cell functioning on a

regular basis. The College maintains zero tolerance to sexual harassment and ragging. During admission in the college, the students are required to submit an anti-ragging declaration duly signed by their parents.

- After the completion of the course, a fair number of our students progressed towards higher education and the job market by getting themselves placed in government and private sectors.
- The institution facilitates representation and engagement of the students in co-curricular activities and cultural events. With the help of the students, the Cultural Sub-Committee and NSS Unit of the college observe various days like NSS day, Independence and Republic Day, Teachers' Day, International language day, women's day, environment day, yoga day etc. to nurture the inherent qualities of the students.
- The College has a registered Alumni Association which frequently organizes meetings. They are an important stakeholder of the college. The college takes feedback from them to improve its functioning related to teaching-learning and other infrastructural issues.
- We received an award from the District Magistrate's Office of Nadia for being the *Best Institution in 2016* in Kaliganj block for *Kanyashree Prakalpa*.
- We have also facilitated the West Bengal Student Credit Scheme (WBSCC) launched by the Government of West Bengal. The scheme is meant to provide a loan up to ten lakhs at a nominal interest rate for the needy and meritorious students to complete their studies.

Governance, Leadership and Management

At Plassey College, leadership and governance entail participative management by the Governing Body, the Principal, the teaching and non-teaching staff, and the students. These stakeholders collaborate in a democratic manner in carrying out their professional responsibilities and accomplishing the vision and mission of the college.

- The college is administered through different policies structured by the Governing Body of the College.
- The Principal, being the executive head executes the day-to-day administration of the College and all the government orders, regulations and policy resolutions of UGC, State Government (WBHED), and the affiliating University etc.
- With the assistance of IQAC, Teachers' Council and different academic and administrative sub-committees the Principal acts to implement the policies successfully.
- The e-governance tools used by the college in admission, examination, administration, and financial matters facilitate ease of access to information to students, faculty, office staff and management.
- Whereas the quality initiatives have been conducted by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell, other auxiliary functions have been done by the Anti-ragging cell, Internal Complaints committee (ICC), and Women's Cell.
- The NSS Unit of the College successfully operates to impart leadership as well as social and national responsibilities among the students.
- The college participates in AISHE and has obtained certificates from it.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution recognizes its responsibility towards the larger society. It attempts to instill the values of

knowledge, wisdom, humility, reverence, pursuit of excellence and solidarity which are the core values of the institution.

.Best Practices:

1. Environmentally Conscious Campus:

The primary objective of the practice is to remain environmentally conscious in our everyday life. It is situated in a green landscape. The college has declared a no smoking zone, banned usage of plastic in the campus, planting saplings and flowers to make the college greener, installation of LED lights and solar panels, rainwater harvesting system and bio-degradable compost pit. These measures are fine, but we understand the need to augment our endeavor and more such similar measures to be undertaken further in realizing the potential of achieving an environmentally conscious campus which is of utmost importance at a time when the issue of climate change has become a sordid reality.

2. Women Empowerment:

The College gives primacy to human values and nurtures students with inherent potentialities. Likewise, the curricular design and delivery of the same the college ensures awareness among the students. Since Plassey College has more girl students than the boys, the delivery of the curriculum within the classroom is very important. The teacher takes care of the social and psychological needs of the students especially the girls following the respective units and sub-units of the syllabus that directly address the women question and focus on gender issues. Outside the classroom, the College organizes special programs through Women Cell and Kanyashree Club that conduct seminars, holds meetings on gender related issues, and makes students aware of gender sensitization through discussions and deliberation. The Women Cell celebrates the International Women's Day every year, organizes seminar on topics such as '*Breast Cancer*', '*The Position of Third Gender in Literature and Society*' to spread awareness.

The college has a Grievance Redressal and Internal Complaints Committees to investigate the sexual harassment cases. The Women Cell of the college counsels the girls to continue study. It takes proactive measures to discourage girls from early marriage, as a part of women empowerment mechanism.

Considering the demand for NEP, the institution has already launched professional training courses on Yoga and Self Defence, etc., which are multidisciplinary. The Career Counselling Cell of the College often organizes several programmes to provide the students with career opportunities and proper guidance to build up their abilities for the tough job market in future, and our NSS unit is always active in grooming students to become socially responsible citizens of the nation; all these activities are conducted beyond the boundaries of the disciplines.</p>
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	<p>Plassey College is affiliated with the University of Kalyani and follows the directions given by the University from time to time. The University, vide notification "Ref.No. CoE/ABC-ID/2/U.G/2023 informed all concerned that the University has registered itself on ABC and directed the College to do the same. Following this advisory, the College also notified its students to register in the portal; consequently, most students have already registered.</p>

Mentoring students is also one of the institution's practices, enabling students to explore future employment pathways after graduation and helping them get the most out of their studies. The intermixing and interdependency among students help integrate cultural diversity into the institution and in society.</p>
<p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>Outcome Based Education, or OBE, is a buzzword today that is gaining significant importance with reference to the modern education system. Increasing research on OBE shifts attention from a teacher-centred education to a learner-based one; it also focuses on what is to be learned, i.e. the outcomes. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and National Education Policy 2020 (NEP), increasingly focus on learners' interests, abilities and skill development making learning process more participative and innovative. The College has always aimed to follow an interactive teaching-learning process to make the essence of education more effective, attractive, and outcome-based. Our college has implemented Outcome-Based Education with clearly stated course and programme outcomes. The teaching-learning is carried out with the outcomes in mind, and evaluation is done according to the criteria laid down through Summative and Formative assessments and assignments as per the rules prescribed by the University of Kalyani. Based on the syllabus given by the University, the College has designed course outcomes and programme outcomes based on cognitive abilities, namely- remembering, understanding, applying, analyzing, evaluating, and creating. Apart from the domain-specific skills, learning outcomes at all levels ensure social responsiveness and ethics so that students contribute</p>

	proactively to the nation's economic, environmental, and social well-being. The outcome of the courses is found to ignite minds to prepare them for society, inculcate scientific temper, develop philosophical thinking, and prepare them for competitive exams.
6. Distance education/online education:	As per the Kalyani University guidelines, our college implemented online education/classes during the pandemic to ensure readiness whenever and wherever practicable. The development of a particular unit for this function has been promoted. Online exams, digital repositories, student support services through LMS, mobile apps, MCQ, competitive examinations, conferences, meetings, and other measures were implemented. Online teaching-learning was introduced in the institution through different platforms like Google Meet and Zoom. Materials were sent through WhatsApp and e-mail. Videos were used as teaching and learning aids, and assessments were taken through Google Forms. Blended forms of teaching and learning are still going on. The College has also subscribed to LMS (Learning Management Software), N-List, which works as a knowledge-gathering repository to benefit its students. Adopting a hybrid form of education that combines online and offline resources has been made possible by the opening of the economy, including that of educational institutions. This new normal is also anticipated in the New Education Policy. Teachers and students will no longer face restrictions on accessing online resources because of the experience learned during the COVID-19 closure period—a well-planned infrastructure with a smart board and laboratory aids in this process. Distance learning courses in PG are taught by Netaji Subhas Open University Study Centre Code (S-01).

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

A curriculum includes contents that strengthen the psycho-social development of a learner by assimilating different functions of intellectual properties. Colleges affiliated to different Universities can't prepare the curriculum of their own but can contribute in the personal as well as social developments through effective curriculum delivery that ensures better teaching-learning in establishing a proper connection between the learner and the society.

- The College is affiliated to the University of Kalyani and thus follows the syllabus designed by the University.
- With a view to delivering the curriculum properly, the **Academic Sub-committee** of the College prepares a **Master Routine** at the beginning of each academic year keeping concurrence with the CBCS structure.
- Departmental routines are prepared following the master routines.
- The Academic Sub-Committee also prepares an academic calendar reflecting all working and teaching days, tentative dates of internal examinations, seminars and other academic activities, observation days etc.
- An induction program is conducted by the Academic Sub-Committee at the beginning of each session to convey the details about the CBCS protocol to the newly admitted students.
- Each Department prepares an academic schedule at the beginning of each academic year with details of commencement of classes, and examinations reflecting on the different academic activities notified in the academic calendar.
- The Departmental routine at the beginning of each academic year is carefully monitored by the Head of the Department as per the assignment distribution.
- The Academic calendar is uploaded in the college website.
- The syllabus is distributed among the teachers through departmental meetings.
- Each Department prepares a detailed syllabus and provides them to the students. This helps the students to keep track with ongoing topics.
- Regular departmental meetings are held to discuss the extent to which the syllabus has been completed and issues regarding continuous internal assessments and evaluation.
- Teachers note down the topics taught in every class to keep track with the progress of the coverage of syllabus.
- Apart from conventional chalk and talk methods, ICT based teaching learning methods are also used.
- During the pandemic, regular online classes were conducted via Google Meet and online evaluations were conducted through home assignments in which students were asked to submit their assignments to institutional email Ids.

- Class notes and scanned study materials were also provided through the College Website.
- To cater in the experiential teaching, few departments that have Projects and Excursions in their curriculum conduct study tours and project works as per syllabus.
- Special care is given to slow learners through the Remedial and Tutorial classes and seminars, extempore, paper-reading sessions, mock teaching sessions are organized for the advanced learners. Students are also given support through a mentor-mentee system existing in the departments of the College.
- For advanced students however, the teachers take personal care to open new vistas of competitive examinations.
- The College is a Post-Graduation Study Center of NSOU since 2021. At present, six subjects are offered in ODL. These are Bengali, History, English, Education, Political Science and MSW.

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:**Student-Centric Methods:**

- Our students are encouraged to “be their own lamp” in the learning process where teachers, besides pointing the ways, actively help them in the learning process.
- Plassey College organizes different programs, seminars, special talks, educational tours, excursions and field visits where the students can participate without hindrance. These programs are sponsored by the college.
- Student lecture series, dissertations and debates are organized where students get actively involved.
- Different outreach Programs are conducted by different departments and particularly NSS. Here students can freely interact with people of different community and learn through participation.
- Students participate in various events in the Youth Parliament Competition organized by the Government of West Bengal.
- Students actively participate in Annual Sports of Plassey College each year. The Annual Sports is preceded by two rounds of Hits. Students take part in inter-college sports competitions arranged by the University or other colleges.

Problem-solving Methods:

- Plassey College employs various problem-solving methodologies like formation of mentor-mentee groups; introduction of remedial classes to solve problems of particularly the slow learners; running different career-oriented programs and courses; and establishment of inter-college collaborations for more expertise solutions of the students’ problems.
- In fact, all educational programs and classes in some way address the problems of students.
- Spoken English classes, computer classes, Yoga and Karate classes are introduced and Kanyashree Club is formed to make the students self-reliant in their problem-solving method.

Use of ICT-enabled Tools:

- Plassey College has, from time to time, taken various initiatives to facilitate learning through digital mode. Smart boards, projectors have been installed in classrooms where teachers impart digital presentation of their topics in the form of seminal presentation, maps, charts, PPTs etc. In large classrooms, sound systems have been installed.
- The college provides free wi-fi to the students.
- The central library of Plassey College is automated where students can check availability of books online. Besides there is availability of online journals which are purchased by the college.
- There is a Mini Indoor Sports Complex with all equipment of gymnasium, a Geography and a Computer Laboratory. In the computer laboratory students can access online resources.
- Teachers attend various seminars, workshops, refresher courses and orientation programs to attain special expertise on the use of modern educational technologies and strategies which are applied in classroom and online teaching,
- Relevant films and other audio-visuals are shown to relate these to the topic taught.
- Students through practical classes are given special training in the use of Google Classrooms, Google Forms, Goggle Drive, Google meet etc.
- Students are encouraged to use ChatGpt, Kindley and other digital technologies and digital store houses of knowledge.

- Details of college programs and notices and upcoming events are also shared in the Facebook page of the college and the respective departments.
- Study materials and videos on lessons are shared to the students via WhatsApp and Telegram groups.
- Through Google Forms, tests are conducted. After end of class, students can review their improvements through tests conducted on Google Form.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1**

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Transparent Mechanism of Internal/ External Assessment:

There is no provision of any external assessment for the subjects taught at Plassey College in the prevalent examination system.

- However, the College authority formulates its own mechanism of Internal Assessment as per UGC and University of Kalyani guidelines. The mechanism is reviewed every academic year.
- In the Internal Evaluation system, focus is given on the overall comprehensibility and inclusive learning of the students.
- Internal Assessment is held as per the Academic Calendar of Plassey college.
- Only candidates having the 75% attendance except on justified medical ground are allowed to appear at examinations.
- Internal examination is organized in a centralized manner by the Examination Committee.
- Mechanisms (assignments/ projects / class tests/ seminar presentation/ Viva) of Internal Examination may change in different semesters.

- In the case of assignments, teachers prepare topics/questions for assignment and students are to attempt the questions and submit the same to the teachers on a specified date.
- Topics for projects/ assignments are provided/ uploaded on the college website at least 7 days before the submission date.
- In the case of class tests, duration of the Internal test of 10 marks is 30 minutes and for 5 marks 15 minutes.
- 5 marks are awarded on the basis of attendance and are calculated as per the University rules. 10 /5 marks are reserved for Class Tests/ Assignments.
- However, there is no provision of any grace mark.
- Marks of internal assessments are published in the college website one week before the commencement of the semester-end examination.
- There is no provision of any retest if a student misses a class test during an ongoing semester. He/she may be given a second chance only with the permission of the Principal provided the student justifies his/ her absence by providing authentic document(s).

Time- Bound and Efficient Nature of Grievance Redressal System:

- At Plassey College the grievance redressal system works on five tiers.
- Students can raise their grievances at Grievance Redressal Cell within one week from date of publication of Internal marks.
- The grievances are then sent over to the concerned Head of the Department.
- The HOD communicates the same to the concerned examiner to solve the existing issues .
- In the case of the pending dissatisfaction of the student, the concerned Head of the Department may review it by himself, or he may refer it to some other teacher.
- In the case of further dissatisfaction of the student, he or she may report the same to the Principal who will take necessary steps. He may constitute a board or take counsel from experts from other college or university.
- On written application to the Principal, evaluated scripts may be shown to the students with necessary comments by the examiner/ reviewer.
- All the process is to be completed within 15 days of complaints received.
- To address any grievances at disposal, the written answer scripts of each test/ assignment for Internal Evaluation are preserved in the college for six (06) months from the date of commencement of the next Semester.

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

- Plassey College provides three year's (Six Semesters) Bachelor's Degree Programme in Arts in Semesterized CBCS System under Honours and Programme/General course.
- Eight subjects are offered for study- Bengali, Education, English, History, Political Science, Sociology, Geography and Physical Education. First five subjects are offered as Honours Programme. However, all the eight subjects are offered as General subjects.
- The curriculum of all the programmes is framed by the University of Kalyani and Plassey College strictly adheres to the curricula.
- On the first day of the class, teachers introduce the syllabus of the concerned subject to the students through an orientation class. Plassey College brochure of 'Program and Course Specific Outcomes' is then shared to the students. It is also available on the college website and hard copies of it are available at Central Library of Plassey College.
- In the programmes, students acquire in-depth knowledge of the subjects. Every programme and course has its inherent outcomes. They have holistic impact on the learners. - Programme outcomes and course outcomes are duly evaluated by the institution during each semester. B.A. degree is awarded to students who complete the entire six (06) semesters bachelor's degree programme.
- Classes are held regularly in accordance with the Master Class Routine set by the Routine Committee. The course work is measured by credit. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. Performance of work done in a semester is measured by Semester Grade Point Average.
- Syllabus and topics are distributed among teachers and are communicated to the students. In case a teacher remains absent, his/ her classes are taken by other teachers as per their availability. On completion of syllabus, teachers make review of earlier lessons taught. Respective teachers are responsible to complete his/ her assignments.
- Different techniques are adopted to promote the learning outcomes of advanced learners and slow learners.
- Co-curricular activities are a regular phenomenon at Plassey College. Co-curricular activities are regarded as tools to measure the Programme outcomes and course outcomes. Students get exposed to extracurricular activities through functioning bodies like NSS. The Students' Union plays a special role in engaging students in Fresher's Welcome, Annual Exhibition, Blood Donation Camp, Farewell function, Cultural Competition, etc. thus promoting harmony.
- There is a continuous and comprehensive evaluation and measuring system of the Programme outcomes and course outcomes of the students in the form of seminars, dissertations, essay writing competitions etc.

3.4 Extension Activities**3.4.1**

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

- The NSS Unit of the college plays a pivotal role in carrying out the outreach and extension activities of the college since its foundation in 2015. The NSS unit of Plassey College adopted a village named *Chapai* on 17th December 2021. The village is a predominantly Santhal village. The village is located within 7 km of the college. The NSS Unit has undertaken several extension activities to establish a positive interaction with the people to bring about a qualitative change in the lives of the people of the village.
- Apart from this, the members of NSS are involved in various programs that are arranged by the college throughout the year such as Blood Donation Camp, World Literacy Day, National Integration Day, Awareness Camp on Dengue and Malaria, Safe Drive Save Life etc. The NSS cell of the institution continued to operate in COVID-19 pandemic situation. They maintain a significant relation cum interaction with the local people of surrounding area even in the pandemic situation.
- The NSS Cell of the college undertook several initiatives in last couple of years. In the lockdown period, the NSS in association with the Block Development Office, Kaliganj organized an online Drawing Competition on 9th August 2021 as part of celebrating *Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav* which was an initiative of the Government of India to celebrate and commemorate 75 years of independence and the glorious history of its people, culture and achievements. Thirty contestants participated from various colleges. The competition was based on themes such as freedom

movement, and review of Indian democracy.

- The NSS Cell as part of its Extension Activities organized a Voting Awareness Programme from 12-18th December 2021. The primary objective of the programme was to generate, in the vicinity of the college, interest and impart education about the importance of giving votes. 22 NSS volunteers actively participated in the said programme in organizing a rally near the Plassey market to spread the message. As a corollary of the event, 25th January 2022 was observed as the National Voters Day.
- The NSS Cell organized a Blood Donation Camp in collaboration with Red Cross Society and Krishnanagar Blood Bank on 5th March 2022. In the camp, there was also the facility of blood group test and 70 noble donors donated blood.
- The NSS Cell actively worked during and after lockdown to spread awareness about the pandemic by undertaking various initiatives such as distribution of masks and sanitizers among students and residents in the surrounding areas especially in crowded places such as market. In view of this masks were distributed in and around Plassey main marker on 6th September 2021 from 11.00AM to 1.00PM.

It provides a copy cataloguing feature using Z39.50.

Administrative Setup:

The College is a government-aided institution affiliated under the University of Kalyani. Its apex body, known as the Governing Body, operates in accordance with the statutes of the university, serving as the primary policy-making authority. The President of the Governing Body holds the highest authority within this structure. The administrative leadership of the College, consisting of the Principal, who also serves as the ex-officio Secretary of the Governing Body, assumes the roles of Head of the Office, executive officer, and Drawing and Disbursing Officer (D.D.O.). All teaching and non-teaching staff function under the Principal's supervision. Upon receiving due approval from the Governing Body (GB),

the Principal ratifies and executes the institution's higher education policies.

Service Rules:

College teachers are expected to adhere to both "The West Bengal Universities and Colleges (Administration & Regulation) Act, 2017" and the "West Bengal Teachers (Security of Service) Act, 1975" and its successive amendments in both their literal interpretation and the underlying principles they embody.

The maintenance of Service Books is conducted by the Service Book & Leave Sub-Committee, a body constituted by the Governing Body (GB) and presided over by the principal himself.

Academic Procedure:

All academic activities are guided by the Academic Sub-Committee.

The Academic Sub-Committee assumes a central role in providing guidance for all academic endeavours within the institution. Its responsibilities encompass the supervision of a diverse array of critical functions, which include formulating master routines, strategic academic planning, organizing departmental seminars, facilitating Wall Magazine, and conducting Continuous Internal Evaluations. Moreover, the Academic Sub-Committee takes it upon itself to address various other academic requirements, including the management of the Online Students' Feedback process. Additionally, the committee undertakes the monitoring of Interdepartmental and Inter College Faculty Exchange programs, oversees parent-teacher meetings, and actively nurtures mentor-mentee relationships among both students and teachers.

Admission Procedure:

Online admissions to UG courses are monitored by the Admission Sub-Committee. Utilization of Resources: Plassey College has state-of-the-art resources like digital notice boards, projectors, water purifiers and purifying system, etc. Because of their proper maintenance, they function properly throughout the year. On discovery of any slightest defect or disfunction, the college get them repaired with far-away from the college with a vision of future campus of the college. The college has purchased land at Panchkhala, Plassey. The land has now been given on lease from which the college has annual income of RTs. 20000.00.

The college has also strategy to have optimum use of the waste parts of electrical apparatuses through reuse or selling them. The college also makes optimal use of human resources in the form of keeping all staffs engaged in developmental activities.

Utilization of Fund: The funds of the institution are oriented toward the maximum benefit of its stakeholders. It is ensured that the Finance Sub-Committee takes care of fund management. The Governing Body is the highest policy-making body through which adequate budgetary provisions are

made for academic and administrative activities. Principal acts as the Drawing and Disbursement Officer. Wherever an expenditure of more than Rs. 1,00,000/- is made, the procedure is done through e-tendering. with a goal of strengthening larger internal checks and control. TALLY has been introduced for maintaining financial accounting system.

Internal Audit: The college possesses an internal audit mechanism designed to oversee its financial transactions. Following a thorough examination of the institution's books of accounts, the internal auditors have opined constructive suggestions and the college has taken several steps to adequately address those issues. These auditors, in turn, authenticate the financial statements of the institute and issue a comprehensive auditor's report. The college has done its internal audit for the financial years of 2020-2021, 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

External Audit: The College undergoes a meticulous audit of its funds, a process overseen by the Auditor appointed by the Government. Over the past five years, the esteemed External Auditors have played a crucial role in this scrutiny. Specifically, the reputable firm M. Mukherjee and Co. served as the Statutory Auditor for the fiscal years 2018-19 and 2019-20. However, the external audit for the subsequent years, namely 2020-21, 2021-22, and 2022-2023, is pending as the State Government is yet to recommend the name of the Statutory Auditor. Meanwhile, the college has completed its internal audit of those financial years. The internal and external audit reports have been uploaded in college website.

Fund Management: Funds collected from Students' Fee Collection, Grant-in Aid and donation etc. are used as per specific purposes. Academic and Physical Maintenance of the Infrastructure, additional funds allotted by the Finance Sub-Committee and Governing Body. Funds utilized through the Tender and Purchase Sub-Committee, and Infrastructure Sub-Committee. All these expenditures are monitored by the Finance Sub-Committee. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college. It meticulously observes, evaluates actions, and directs the respective sub-committees to ensure proper performance.

- The IQAC holds meeting on a regular basis to discuss about various academic matters for high quality maintenance. Special care is taken for smooth and rapid effectiveness of the resolutions adopted in the meeting for quality improvement with respect to teaching- learning process.
- At the behest of IQAC, meetings of Academic Council are often held to discuss about the level of learning outcomes. Minute discussion is held in the meeting to provide the best teaching on the part of the teacher without any negligence and creating best teaching- learning environment.
- IQAC keeps close on the outcomes of the meetings for ensuring quality education and measures them through the incremental improvements of the learners in various extra-curricular activities. IQAC along with other bodies and sub-committees work continuously for ensuring quality education being imparted to the learners.
- IQAC has made significant contributions also in the following ways:
 - **Performance Evaluation and Planning:** Through regular meetings, the IQAC assesses the performance of the academic departments and formulates a comprehensive Plan of Action (PoA) for successful curriculum delivery and the progressive development of human resources.
 - **Curriculum Management:** In collaborating with the Academic Sub-committees and all departments, the IQAC develops the academic calendar and oversees syllabus modularization efforts by different departments.
 - **Continuous Internal Evaluation System:** The IQAC, in coordination with the Academic Subcommittee, focuses on maintaining a continuous internal evaluation system. Additionally, it operates a mentor-mentee system where students can discuss with their mentor the problems they face, academic matters and curriculum outside of regular class schedules. Special remedial classes are organized for slow learners.
 - **Academic Spirit and Events:** In collaboration with various academic departments and the Seminar and Workshop Subcommittee, the IQAC organizes seminars, workshops, webinars, and other research and academic topics. It also fosters academic spirit through student seminars and Wall magazine publications.
 - **Feedback Collection and Analysis:** The IQAC plays a vital role in collecting (both online and offline) and analyzing feedback from students, teachers, alumni, and employers. These feedback reports are thoroughly examined to initiate necessary actions, and the subsequent Action Taken Reports are monitored for essential intervention.
 - **Teaching-Learning Process and Infrastructure Review:** Regular reviews of the teaching-learning process, infrastructural facilities, operational methodologies, and learning outcomes are conducted to align with course and program outcomes.
 - **Learning Infrastructure Development:** Collaborating with the Infrastructure Maintenance and Development Subcommittee and Technology for Upgradation Subcommittee, the IQAC facilitates the development of enhanced ICT-based seminar halls, a Central Laboratory, and an upgraded computer laboratory to improve teaching and research facilities.
 - **Academic and Administrative Audit:** The IQAC conducts Internal Academic Audits annually, presenting the findings to external auditors for a comprehensive review of all curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities.

Response:

- Ensuring Gender equity is a measure of empowering women. It is aimed to compensate for women's historical and social disadvantages that prevent women and men from otherwise operating on a level playing field. Plassey College has adopted several gender equity measures.
- Plassey college is quite sensitive in dealing with third genders also. It has a separate toilet for Third-gender students. To remove any gender biasness, the college organizes sensitization programs inviting third gender dignitaries at our college.
- Every year the number of admitted female students remain greater than the number of the male students at Plassey College. Special care is taken to ensure that girl students of Plassey college enjoy all the benefits and privileges the college can provide them including the Government benefits in the form of scholarships.
- There is a continuous effort to keep the environment of the college women-friendly where each and every women is treated with dignity and nobody engages himself in the evil practice of Eve-teasing. Zero tolerance policy regarding sexual harassment and gender-based biases are strictly maintained. To promote gender equity and women education Girls' hostel of the college is named after Rokeya Sakhawat Hossain.
- For empowering women Karate course has been introduced. Women writings and history of women in the course curriculum have special place in the undergraduate course curriculum of various subjects. The semester- wise course curriculum deals with issues and studies on women empowerment, feminist approach, women education, history of women from ancient to post-colonial era and role in politics, economic field, socio- cultural aspects. In co-curricular and extension activities, women participation is encouraged.
- The Women Cell of the college organizes different seminars/webinars related to gender equity which includes illuminating talks from dignified speakers.
- The Grievance redressal Cell & Internal Complaints Committee takes prompt initiatives regarding student grievances and redressal for the same. students can submit their complaints in the respective complaint boxes in order to make the process safer. The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) also organizes film shows related to gender oppression and legal issues.
- Plassey College has also received an appreciation award under the Kanyashree scheme of the Government of West Bengal being the best institution in the Nadia district and for securing the 1st position with respect to achievement of Kanyashree target 2018-2019.
- The Institution provides several measures for the safety and security of the female students. The college ensures usage of CCTV to provide a constant check on the incoming and outgoing students for the safety of the students.
- The College provides security guards at the entrance of the institution, which includes female

security guards as well for the safety of the female students, so that no outsiders are allowed to enter the college premise.

- The college has a properly maintained girls' common room.

Response:

- Plassey College firmly believes in the importance of promoting and upholding cultural inclusiveness and harmony among students and staff regardless of faith, language, creed, caste, gender, cultural, linguistic and social backgrounds. In order to promote this motto, the college has undertaken several measures at various times throughout the years.
- Programs like *Vasanta Utsav*, *Matri Bhasha Divas* on 21st February have been celebrated by students of all faiths and cultural backgrounds. These events and programs have been celebrated and observed in the form of physical events, international and national seminars as well as programs on the online platform through webinars during lockdown.
- The onset of online events and webinars was observed during the pandemic years and has been integrated properly by the college. Plassey College does not believe in any sort of discrimination based on one's cultural, linguistic, or religious orientation. The college strictly adheres to the values espoused by the Indian Constitution. The college has been able to create a culture of fellow-feelings and brotherhood among all stakeholders during religious festivals of different communities.
- Other events organized by the College on a regular basis include *Basanta Utsav*, which consisted of dance, recitation of Bengali poems and Bengali music festival and concluding *Abir Khela* (festival of colour.) The NSS Unit of the college regularly organizes various community outreach

- The NSS unit also conducts awareness camps and performs activities in neighbourhood areas and in the adopted village at *Champai* to inculcate the value of responsible citizens. The NSS unit performed special Corona awareness camps during the COVID period both inside the college and in the adjoining areas. Commemorative days like College Foundation Day, Teachers' Day, National Integration Day, National Youth Day, Rabindra Jayanti, Nazrul Jayanti, and observation days like World Earth Day, World Environment Day, International Yoga Day, International day of biodiversity are celebrated each year to create social values and responsibilities among the students.
- Plassey College is sensitive to the socio-economic background of the learners. Classroom teaching learning process is encouraged in such ways as to make the students reduce their dependency on private tutors to reduce financial burden on their parents. For that, special talks, remedial classes are frequently organized.

Response:

Best Practice 1: Environment Conscious Campus

1. Title of the Practice: Environmentally Conscious Campus

Objective of the Practice:

- The primary objective of the practice is to remain environmentally conscious in our everyday life.
- The college is situated in a green landscape, hence, within our limited capacity we want to impart

environmental values in the minds of our students.

The Context

We try to transform our college into an eco-friendly campus. The issue of climate change is a matter of concern. It is high time to pay due care to environmental concerns for their scientific mitigation unless it is too late.

The Practice:

We prescribe positive practice in our list. We aim to educate our students and make every stakeholder of the college conscious of the environment.

1. The college campus is a **plastic free zone**.
2. Every year we plant saplings of many trees to make the college greener.
3. We have a **Rainwater Harvesting System**.
4. We have a **Flower Garden** for beautification of the campus. It has some medicinal plants which have a salutary impact on the environment.
5. We have a **Bio-Degradable Compost Pit**.
6. We have converted to **100% LED** tubes and bulbs for lighting purposes.
7. We are using **solar energy** from **Solar Panels** installed on the rooftop of the academic building.
8. Most of our students and faculties use bicycles or public transport.
9. We have a storeroom for e-waste materials.
10. We have installed several dustbins at different points of the campus to collect solid waste and liquid waste.
11. The bio-degradable items and non-biodegradable items are collected separately.

Evidence of Success:

1. We stopped using plastic in our college. We use paper cups for taking tea.
2. Rainwater is used in toilets and for cleaning purposes.
3. We keep our campus clean by collecting garbage systematically. Flower gardens cause a soothing effect on our eyes and create a proper mood of learning.
4. We have replaced our all lights with **LED tubes and bulbs**.
5. We have installed **Sensor System** in Principal's chamber, teachers' room and in one of the offices in the ground floor of annexe building to save energy and to increase more in the future

Problems Encountered and Resource Required:

1. The college is located in a lowland area which often creates a flood-like situation during rainy seasons. It acts as a hindrance in realizing the full potential of a green campus.
2. College is taken during election. Consequently, the greenery in the campus gets affected.

Notes Optional:

We work with NGOs working in the field of environment, like "Paribesh Bandhab of Krishnanagar for keeping us updated.

Best Practice2: Women Empowerment

Objectives of the Practice:

Empowerment includes elevating the status of women through education, awareness camps, and training programs. It depends on the policies adopted by the institution to ensure its actualization. Women empowerment is about equipping women to assert their agency. The objective is to educate the girls through various activities by imparting knowledge and instilling leadership in them.

The Context:

The college has served as a platform in providing education mostly to first-generation learners. It is situated in a rural area with students from poor economic backgrounds. Since the number of girl students is more, women empowerment is of utmost importance.

The Practice:

The college has taken several initiatives to educate the girl students by bringing them to the mainstream. lectures and discussion indeed can't solve their problems. So, the college has implemented various initiatives in empowering women.

1. The inclusion of women centric topics in the curriculum and their delivery is important from a theoretical perspective which will ensure steps to be taken on the ground to resolve the problem.
2. The college has a common room for the girls. In the **Girls' Common Room** there are provisions of carom board for their leisure.
3. The college has installed two **sanitary napkin vending machines** in the girls' common room.
4. In the girls' common room a breastfeeding corner is established.
5. The college has a **Grievance Redressal Committee** to investigate sexual harassment cases. The **Women Cell** of the college counsels the girls about the importance to continue study.
6. The college level **Kanyashree Club** is a forum to discuss various socio-economic problems encountered by the girls. Kanyashree Club is an exclusive female club.
7. The issue of third gender enriches gender discourse. The Bengali Department, IQAC and Women Cell of the college organized a **Gender Sensitization Campaign** through a seminar on '*The Position of Third Gender in Literature and Society*' in which the keynote speaker was **Dr Manabi Bandopadhyay, India's first transgender college principal**.
8. The college celebrates International Women's Day on 8th March each year by organizing seminar on gender issues.

Evidence of success:

1. The number of girl students' enrollment has increased.
2. The girl students have performed considerably well in university examination.
3. They are performing well in the various cultural and sports activities.
4. Kanyashree Club is a sub-committee consisting of several girl representatives.
5. The number of girl volunteers in the NSS Unit has increased. Girls take part in various community outreach programs.

Problem Encountered and the Resources Required:

- 1.Lack of experience on ground to come out of the problem.
- 2.Despite arranging several programs on ‘Women Empowerment’ the problem continues to persist.
- 3.During Covid Pandemic, it was observed that several girl students got married off at an early age even before they could graduate. Consequently, many of the girl students dropped out because of early marriage.

Notes (Optional)

To implement this best practice the following resources are required by the college:

1. NCC Unit with substantial presence of girl students.
- 2.More involvement of girl students in **Karate, Yoga** courses run by the college at free of cost. This will shape their personality and will instill a sense of confidence in them.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

“Where the mind is without fear and the head is held high
Where knowledge is free
Where the world has not been broken up into fragments
By narrow domestic walls”.

These immortal lines by Tagore have been etched in our collective conscience when it relates to dealing with issues of education and human dignity as potential enablers of social and intellectual emancipation. Prime motive in imparting education at Plassey College has always been man-making, to help learners manifest his human and divine qualities through which he can live with holding his head high in a world with universal brotherhood and fellow-feeling. Transcending the boundary of college campus, Plassey

College aims to disseminate education and human values in adjoining areas and also at the adopted village *Champai*.

Plassey College was established in the year 2010. The demand for a degree college in the area with the prime objective of spreading light of knowledge to pupils who remained excluded from the rubric of education for generations led to the formation of the college. The college has a threefold responsibility which reflect its distinctiveness: **firstly, to create opportunities for first generation learners by opening the door of the college for them, secondly, to ensure that students from minority and other oppressed communities must not get excluded from education and thirdly, to look after the female students by ensuring their completion of study in college.** Besides being one of our best practices, women empowerment is also a distinctive character of the institution. The notion of social justice enshrined in Indian Constitution assumes a significant character in such a scenario. It is only through education and knowledge that we can create a sense of equity. Since its inception, the college has been painstakingly making endeavors in realizing these visions and remains committed to these principles.

Riding on the pillar of success in achieving the desired goal of becoming the platform for first generation learners within a decade of its coming into being, the college is morally bound to augment its social responsibility by extending its outreach activities in the neighbourhood. In doing this, the college through its NSS Unit has adopted a nearby village called *Champai* on 17th December 2021. *Champai* is a pre-dominantly an Adivasi village.

Motive behind adoption of Champai: Champai village is located in Kaliganj block. It is 6 kilometres away from Plassey College. The motive behind adoption of this village is deplorable backwardness of the village. Most of the tribal villagers are daily wage earners. They work in brick lanes, leaving their wards to play under the open sky with the old family members. The villagers even do not have properly built houses, they live in poorly built thatched houses. There are no drainage systems; even the villagers do not have functional toilets in their homes.

Most of the boys and girls above ten years of age have given up their studies and joined their parents in work and the children have little hope to be acquainted with education. Under these circumstances, Plassey College decides to take active measures in order to develop the village in matters of health and education. It is decided that Plassey College will take special responsibility with respect to education of the wards of the villagers and their health. Children and students of the village will be provided all kinds of assistance in their education and health. Books and game equipments were all provided free of cost. Any student from the village who will be admitted in Plassey College will be waived from all kinds of fees for pursuing studies in Plassey College.

Other programs organized at the village:

25th February, 2022 Educational Awareness Camp:

On this day text books, reference books, and football jerseys and 3 footballs were distributed to the needy students of the village. Principal of the college assured the villagers in all kinds of assistance in the field of education.

4th August 2022- Special Literacy Program:

NSS Program Officer Chandan Barman and Rakesh Chakroborty conducted a Special Literacy Drive at the adopted village Books, exercise books, pens were distributed to the children and they were taken special classes. After end of the classes they were provided with foods.

18th August, 2022 Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav:

Special feature of the program was in the Children's pleasure in showcasing small flags to feel the joys of freedom. They were provided books, slates, pencils for study and were practised the alphabets.

Special Drive at for School Drop-out Students:

On finding out a drop out boy NSS took active measure to return the boy to school. His school leaving certificate were collected from the school and steps were taken to get him admitted for further education.

Special Camp (20th March– 26th March):

Apart from the Program Officer and some other teachers, 50 NSS Volunteers participated in the Special Camp. In the Special camp almost all the villagers were benefitted. The NSS Volunteers aided by the Experts made the villagers aware in different fields like cleanliness, Literacy, Fitness Program. The response of the villagers is remarkable. The NSS unit of the college has conducted a 7 days Camp in the village in March 2022 in an attempt to augment its presence in the village through a gamut of activities. Notwithstanding its limitations, the college is also contemplating to broaden its level of engagement by taking responsibility of few Adivasi children's education till they attain college/university degrees.

6. 25th March - Saturday: Fitness Programme including YOGA
7. 27th March - Monday: Cultural Programme

- We have made the entire transaction system online. We no longer receive cash for any transaction to bring about more transparency.
- We have got the approval to open NCC in our college. The inspection has already been done. The NCC will start to function very soon.
- The NSS Unit of the college has adopted a nearby village called Chapai which is a pre-dominantly tribal village to carry out a plethora of social and community outreach initiatives.
- We feel privileged to have more girl students in our college despite being a rural campus with students hailing from economically and socially marginalized backgrounds. This gives us an opportunity amidst several challenges to work out strategies to ensure women empowerment.

Concluding Remarks :

The college is going for the first cycle of NAAC Accreditation and Assessment since its journey as an undergraduate college in 2010. Throughout this period, the college undertakes painstaking efforts by overcoming several hurdles to create a healthy culture which is essential to face the NAAC. The creation of a NAAC conducive work culture for a new college like ours where several challenges/obstacles are overbearing is of paramount importance. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been instrumental in this entire process which has relentlessly pursued its objectives as a fulcrum of perseverance, dedication, tenacity and will power to execute the assignment of NAAC.

The Governing Body (GB) being the highest decision-making body of the college has elicited great amount of inspiration and motivation among all the stakeholders during the entire preparation process and has made all requisite material resources available at the disposal of IQAC to continue with its pursuance of NAAC Accreditation.
