

In a 1775 English dictionary pandemic is described as an adjective formed from a Greek word meaning 'incident to a whole people'. In India it is called mahamari. The first pandemic is called the 'Justinian Plague' which was bubonic. The plague depleted the populace of many towns. The plague spread from Byzantium to Italy and Spain. Soon there was shortage of labour force and financial crisis ensued. Then Black Death ravaged Europee, northern Africa and West Asia between 1346 and 1353. It has often been
